## COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines fairy tales now and then. We will discuss theories of folklore study, learn about the historical-cultural context of the tales, and read a number of the tales themselves; we will study the literary fairy tale of the 19<sup>th</sup> century as a genre in which authors used fairy tale motifs as the basis for short stories and novellas; we will also look at examples of contemporary fairy tales, attempt a feminist reading of the material, and finally, we will reflect on how fairy tales and fairy tale motifs appear in contemporary popular culture. We will study the evolution and adaptation of fairy tales across time, literary genres, media, and national boundaries.

- Improve the ability to express yourself orally and in writing.
- Understand main concepts related to German fairy tales
- Experience literature as a source of both personal enjoyment and intellectual stimulus.
- Improve your ability to read and analyze complex texts in German
- Develop research skills to prepare essays and a research poster
- Improve your ability to work in teams

## COURSE POLICIES

### CLASS PARTICIPATION

Participation and collaboration are essential in this class. Your opinion counts! We will work together to achieve the objectives of this course (as stated above). Your engagement with the texts outside the classroom will influence your enjoyment and understanding, but also that of the rest of the class. Please turn your camera on during class.

### ASSIGNMENTS AND RELATED POLICY

**Reading:** If you do not read the assigned material, the course will be boring and useless to you.

**Writing:** There will be two written assignments, as listed on the course calendar. Handouts for each will be provided well in advance of the due dates.

It is expected that you use correct and accurate grammatical usage and issues of grammar will not hinder your ability to express yourself in a way that I can understand without great effort. You are encouraged to engage in peer evaluation of your German papers (with “peers” understood solely as members of this class and/or the German tutor).

**Film screenings:** A few films will be screened and/or otherwise made available as indicated on the course calendar. They will be made available to you in a way that is as convenient as possible.

**Team Sessions:** On the course calendar, you will see class periods reserved for team sessions. Your team will brainstorm initial topic ideas and plan meeting dates/times. Leading up to your

session, you meet several times in order to deliberate on two important matters: 1) what text(s) will you have the class read or view in preparation for your session, and 2) how will you approach that text in class? You will then okay that topic with me, read/view the work you have selected and meet with your group to discuss your reactions to it. You may also discuss your ideas with me at any time, and you must meet with me at least once in preparation for the session (after topic approval), at least a week before your group's date as specified in the course calendar. You will keep a log of group meetings, as this will be turned in to me after your session. Before making a final decision about which text to assign, please get my approval, so that we don't discuss the same text twice.

On the day of the team session, class will be conducted by the group in question. Each group will make the assignment for their class day, and the assigned text must relate in some obvious way to texts we have read. Each team session will begin with the group's overall analysis of the assigned work, as established in your deliberations leading up to the session. What issues are important in this work? How are they handled in the text? What should we have noticed while reading? What is your "take" on the work as a whole? The analysis portion of your session can take the form of a conventional presentation (or not). The remaining class time will consist of two segments designed by the team. These segments might take the following forms: hands-on activities that engage some element of the text in question, role plays, debates, small- or large-group discussions with a particular purpose in mind, games, or other creative activities. Anything is possible, as long as it offers us the possibility for in-depth engagement with the reading. This is your chance to make an assignment, take the class in any direction you wish, and illuminate a text for your peers.

**If you are unexpectedly absent on the day of your team session, you will not receive credit for having participated in any way, i.e., you get a zero.** Please keep in mind that the team session is as much about process as the final, in-class product. Therefore, know that your peers will evaluate your participation and contributions to the project, and that evaluation will form a significant portion of your grade.

**"Adult situations"** might appear in texts in this course. At some points, we may discuss sexuality and other key, yet "touchy" aspects of human existence in a frank, open, grown-up, and relevant way. If you are offended by such discussion, you probably need to rethink taking this class.

**Attendance: Due to the pandemic, the university is not making attendance mandatory.** However, it does not make sense to sign up for a class and then not show up. Choose wisely.

**Participation:** Every week of class is worth up to 20 points, assigned according to the rubric (posted on MS Teams). If you are absent for the entire week, your participation is obviously "0."

**Due Dates** are real, just as they are in the career world after college. All written assignments are due at class time on the due date. Grades for assignments turned in any time after papers are

accepted, but still on the due date will be reduced by 10%. For each additional calendar day, a further 20% will be deducted.

Even if you are absent on a due date, please arrange to get your work to me by class time on the missed day in order to receive full credit.
