"Scopes at 100: Before the Trial of the Century and a Century Later"

In 1925, the state of Tennessee tried and convicted schoolteacher John Scopes for teaching about evolution in the Rhea County schools. His July trial in the sweaty East Tennessee courtroom was an instant spectacle broadcast live by WGN radio and breathlessly covered in newspapers across the country. For more than a week, Dayton welcomed famed defense attorney Clarence Darrow sparring with three-time presidential nominee William Jennings Bryan, scientists, street preachers, throngs of curious onlookers and at least one monkey posing for pictures. How did the trial come to be and what has come of the anti-evolution movement in the following century?
