## **President's Comments**

President Oldham advised the fall semester is off to a great start with lots of energy and progress visible across our campus. Beginning with the RUC expansion project currently underway. Over the next year, we will see a tremendous change in how the RUC serves students. With the approximately 11,500 additional square feet, the students will have provide more outdoor seating and larger student lounge areas.

President Oldham also stated enrolment was initially projected to be down this year, but is looking up. A census is going on now to confirm the enrollment numbers. With one of the largest graduating classes on record last year, it is important to enroll new students and assist them in completing their degrees in a timely fashion. TTU is on track to do this. With the cost of higher education, our university provides graduates with one of the highest returns on compared to other Tennessee universities, according to Money magazine. This stands as a reminder of the competitive environment of higher education. We are striving to make TTU as affordable and accessible as possible for all.

Groundbreaking for the new Lab Science Building is scheduled during Homecoming week on Nov. 3. This will be a signature building on campus with 160,000 square feet of lab and workspace. It is expected to have a two-year construction phase. The sciences faculty continue to be actively involved in the design of this project. President Oldham thanked them for their continued input and involvement. Construction on the second signature building project, Recreation and Fitness Center is beginning on 7<sup>th</sup> Street and Dixie. If you have the opportunity to go over to the newly renovated Jere Whitson Hall, go. It is now a one-stop welcome center for students and families with Admissions, Financial Aid and Records departments all located in a single unified space. We also have other capital projects in the works including Kittrell and Bartoo Hall renovations on our historic quadrangle. The parking lot behind Tech Village is finishing up and the additional temporary lot on Willow Avenue is in use now. We will continue to monitor parking campus wide.

President Oldham then shared information on the Tech is Tennessee Tour. The tour began its focus on the local schools in the Upper Cumberland area. Spreading the message, that TTU values our local communities and how we encourage those schools and our university not to take each other for granted. Those schools have indicated TTU is doing a wonderful job creating the right experiences for our prospective local students. TTU has a unique opportunity being one of two Tennessee universities with a statewide focus. This tour will assist in expanding the footprint of TTU, as President Oldham plans visit schools in each of the 95 counties in Tennessee.

Lastly, President Oldham discussed the implementation of the Strategic Planning Committee. This committee is led by Dean Tom Payne and Dean Lisa Zagumny. They will prepare focus groups, one-on-one conversations as well as larger meetings shortly. The committee will serve as ambassadors for staff to contact and communicate in regards to suggestions and questions. President Oldham encouraged the audience to look at the committee members list and reach out Page 3

President Oldham has charged the committee to find ways to focus on how to serve others during a time of rapid technological change.
