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STUDENT AFFAIRS DEBUTS OFFICE FOR FIRST-GENERATION STUDENT SUCCESS

The Division of Student Affairs is making strides in supporting its student body with the launch of the Office of First-Generation Student Success. Under the leadership of Dr. Harry Ingle, Executive Director of Student Affairs, this department aims to empower first-generation college students, providing them with resources and support to excel in their academic and personal goals.

The establishment of this office reflects the Division's commitment to fostering a supportive educational environment. As the first person in their family to attend college, these students often face unique challenges, from navigating complex academic issues to balancing family expectations and financial pressures.

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The office aims to bridge these gaps by providing the necessary support and resources to ease their transition into higher education. The initiative is not just about addressing immediate academic hurdles but also about empowering students to navigate and overcome broader factors that influence their academic and personal success.

Dr. Ingle, who recently came to Student Affairs via the College of Engineering, will spearhead the new office. With a background in student support and an understanding of the obstacles first-generation students encounter, Dr. Ingle is well-equipped to lead this initiative.

Ingle emphasized the importance of this initiative, stating, "We are excited to join the FirstGen Forward network and to kick off the University's inaugural first-generation student success initiatives. Our efforts involve engaging first-generation students and their families from the recruitment stage through their entire journey at Tech and beyond. We aim to serve as a central resource hub, connecting first-generation students with vital resources and first-gen faculty across campus to support their success and enrich their college experience."

The launch of this office is a significant step forward for the Division of Student Affairs and Tennessee Tech as a whole, aligning with broader efforts to enhance student success. By prioritizing the needs of first-generation students, the university demonstrates its commitment to creating an environment where all students can achieve their academic and career goals.



ENHANCING AWARENESS WITH QR CODE INNOVATIONS

On June 25, Leigh Ann Ray, in collaboration with the Tennessee Department of Health and the University of Tennessee-Knoxville, delivered a presentation focused on enhancing vaccination awareness within college settings. The discussion centered on the latest data and educational resources for vaccinations, aiming to equip participants with the knowledge needed to prepare for the upcoming upper respiratory infection (URI) season.

A highlight of Ray's presentation was the innovative approach her team employed to disseminate vaccine information: the creation of a QR Code wall in the lobby waiting room. This dynamic tool allows patients to easily access crucial information about vaccines and other infectious diseases by simply scanning the QR codes. The QR Code wall links directly to an information section on their website, providing a seamless and efficient way for patients to stay informed.







The project was funded by a generous grant from the Tennessee Department of Health, highlighting the crucial role of collaborative efforts in advancing public health initiatives. This funding support underscores the commitment to fostering partnerships that address community health challenges. In her presentation, Ray shared a wealth of insights and lessons learned from previous clinics.

By focusing on the specific needs and dynamics of college environments, Ray's presentation ensured that institutions are better prepared to respond effectively to the upcoming URI season. Her contributions emphasized the importance of preparedness, resource allocation, and strategic planning in safeguarding the health of college populations.



TECH COUNSELORS HONORED FOR RESEARCH AT NATIONAL CONFERENCE

The research of two of Tech's counselors, Ravi Patel and Lara Strate, were recognized at the American College Counselors Association Conference in Orlando, Florida from February 23-25.

In accordance with the American College Counseling Association's mission to strengthen the practice of college counseling and encourage communication and exchange between college counselors, Mr. Patel and Ms. Strate presented their research at this conference. Ravi Patel's research is titled "Equipping Collegiate Clinicians: Treating the Effects of Transgenerational Trauma from Natural Disasters," and Ms. Strate's research is titled "The Relationship Between Alexithymia and Highly Sensitive Persons: A Literature Review." Their research presentation at this conference shows the Tennessee Tech counselors' commitment to providing the best mental health care.



DENIM DAY: HEALTH SERVICES STANDS WITH SURVIVORS


